The Women in Recycling Foundation (WORF) is a Non-Government Ogranization with Registration No. ooNGO/R/1622) based in Tanzania, dedicated to empowering women, girls, and youth through sustainable waste management and circular economy initiatives. Established to address the intersection of environmental challenges and gender inequality, WORF focuses on transforming waste into valuable resources while creating economic opportunities for marginalized communities.

Our core programs equip women and youth with skills in recycling, green entrepreneurship, and financial literacy, enabling them to launch independent businesses that contribute to both environmental sustainability and economic independence. WORF also runs community education and awareness campaigns, advocating for climate justice and inclusive governance in waste management.

Mission: Empower women and girls, particularly those living on less than \$2 per day, through sustainable waste management practices to improve livelihoods and promote environmental stewardship.

Vision: A society where waste is sustainably managed, fostering a cleaner environment and creating economic opportunities for marginalized women and girls.



Our Model

The Women in Recycling Foundation (WORF) employs a holistic and sustainable model to empower women, girls, and youth through innovative approaches to waste management and economic development. Our model is built on five interconnected pillars that ensure lasting impact:

Engage

We actively involve communities, women, and youth to foster awareness and participation in waste management initiatives.

Engagement includes educational campaigns, workshops, and community-driven activities to inspire collective action toward sustainability.

Develop

We provide comprehensive training programs that equip women and youth with practical skills in recycling, waste management, and green entrepreneurship.

Our programs focus on capacity building, enabling participants to create innovative solutions and establish micro-enterprises.

Empower

WORF offers financial literacy training, resource mobilization, and access to funding opportunities to help participants build sustainable businesses.

Empowerment ensures financial independence and the ability to scale their operations.

Connect

We establish market linkages for recycled products, partnering with local and international stakeholders to create steady demand and economic opportunities.

WORF also facilitates networking opportunities to connect participants with mentors, investors, and collaborators.

Thrive/Sustain


Sustainability is central to our model. We implement ongoing monitoring and adaptation of programs to ensure long-term environmental and economic impact.




Directed reach By Age and Gender



Engage

Early in January this year, the Women in Recycling Foundation (WORF) initiated a strategic partnership with the local government of the Makangarawe community in Temeke Municipal. WORF introduced its mission of empowering women in waste management and recycling and expressed an interest in collaboration to address key challenges in the sector. As part of this engagement, WORF sought the support of local leaders to conduct a baseline survey of women working in waste management within the community.

The focus of this initiative was to empower women through knowledge sharing, skills development, and capacity building, creating pathways for sustainable livelihoods. WORF emphasized the importance of collaboration with local leaders to ensure that the project was both impactful and aligned with the community's specific needs.

Agreement and Action Items

Following these discussions, WORF and the local government of the Makangarawe community reached the following agreements:

Local leaders agreed to partner with WORF and support its initiatives in the community.

Both parties committed to conducting a baseline survey to identify the challenges, needs, and opportunities for women in waste management.

Local leaders pledged their support in mobilizing women for participation and facilitating the implementation of WORF's activities.

This collaboration marked a critical step in WORF's efforts to empower women and promote sustainable waste management practices in the Makangarawe community

Impact

The partnership with the local government yielded the following outcomes:

Enhanced Collaboration: Establishing a partnership with local authorities increased trust and fostered a shared commitment to addressing waste management challenges.

Baseline Survey Insights: The survey provided critical data on the socio-economic and operational conditions of women in the waste management sector, helping to identify key areas for intervention.

Empowerment Framework: The partnership established a foundation for WORF's future initiatives, including training programs and the creation of recycling microenterprises.

Lessons Learned

Collaboration Drives Success: Engaging local leaders early in the process ensures alignment with community priorities and fosters a sense of ownership in the initiative.

Community Buy-In is Essential: Local government support played a key role in mobilizing participants and facilitating data collection.

Tailored Solutions are Key: The baseline survey revealed the unique challenges faced by women in waste management, emphasizing the need for customized interventions.



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"Economic Women Empowerment through Recycling Activities" project by conducting a thorough project mobilization survey with 130 women from the Makangarawe community. This initiative, undertaken in collaboration with Ms. Kayombo, the Community Development Officer, aimed to gain a comprehensive understanding of the economic realities and daily challenges these women face.

By exploring their income levels, work conditions, and personal aspirations, we are laying the groundwork for a tailored program that not only addresses their immediate needs but also equips them with the skills and resources necessary for long-term economic empowerment through recycling activities. This baseline survey is pivotal in shaping our project's direction, ensuring that our efforts are aligned with the true needs of the community, and paving the way for transformative change in the lives of these women.

Results of the baseline survey

Economic Challenges:

- Most women earn less than \$2/day; some less than \$1/day in profit from small-scale waste management.
- High unemployment (89%); limited access to formal jobs and resources.
- Financial literacy gaps hinder income growth and management.

Environmental Challenges:

- Temeke generates ~1,000 tons of waste daily; inadequate management leads to pollution and flooding.
- Unsafe working conditions and exposure to hazardous waste.
- Low awareness of long-term environmental impacts.

Community Strengths:

- Resilience and eagerness to learn new skills like recycling and business management.
- Strong engagement and trust-building through collaboration with local leaders.

Key Metrics

• 130 Women Surveyed: A comprehensive dataset was collected to understand their economic, social, and environmental realities.

• Identified Needs:

- o 85% of respondents expressed interest in financial literacy and entrepreneurship training.
- o 78% indicated a lack of access to recycling markets and tools as a primary barrier.

• Opportunities Highlighted:

- o High willingness to participate in structured training programs.
- o Recognition of recycling as a viable pathway to both economic empowerment and environmental conservation.



Develop

1. In 2024, the Women in Recycling Foundation (WORF) launched a series of targeted training sessions under the "Develop" pillar, designed to build the capacity of women in the Makangarawe community in waste management and recycling. The first session, facilitated by Mr. Abdi from HUDEFO & ECOHUB, focused on the fundamentals of waste management. Participants were introduced to essential concepts such as waste segregation, the environmental impact of improper disposal, and the critical role of women in influencing household and community waste practices. Practical demonstrations and interactive discussions enabled participants to grasp the importance of sustainable waste management and its impact on environmental health.

The second session featured a local contractor who shared real-world experiences of waste management challenges and opportunities within the community. This session highlighted the barriers women face, such as limited resources and inadequate infrastructure, while emphasizing their potential to lead change through improved waste handling and disposal practices.

The third session, led by WORF Chairperson Ms. Helena Sailas, explored recycling as a pathway to economic empowerment. Participants were inspired by case studies and success stories of women who had turned recycling into profitable ventures. Ms. Sailas shared her personal journey in waste management, motivating attendees to view recycling not only as a tool for environmental conservation but also as a viable business opportunity. The final session, facilitated by Community Development Officer Mrs. Kayombo, provided an in-depth overview of governmental support mechanisms available for women-led environmental projects. Participants learned how to access grants, loans, and technical assistance, as well as strategies for crafting strong project proposals aligned with national environmental and gender equity goals. Across these sessions, participants gained critical knowledge, practical skills, and actionable insights, leaving them empowered to implement waste management practices in their homes and communities.

Future plans include advanced training workshops, mentorship programs, and forming women-led recycling collectives to scale the impact of these initiatives beyond the Makangarawe community. Through these efforts, WORF continues to drive economic empowerment and environmental sustainability hand in hand.



Results

As part of our capacity-building initiatives in 2024, the Women in Recycling Foundation successfully formed 12 groups of women, each consisting of 10 members, resulting in a total of 120 women actively participating in our programs. These women, aged between 18 and 40, represent a dynamic and motivated demographic with the potential to lead transformative change in their households and communities. By organizing into structured groups, the participants are better equipped to collaborate, share knowledge, and support one another in implementing waste management and recycling practices. This group-based approach fosters teamwork and collective ownership, creating a solid foundation for sustainable impact and economic empowerment.

2. In 2024, the Women in Recycling Foundation (WORF) successfully conducted a Women Empowerment Training Orientation at our newly secured demonstration venue in the Makangarawe community. This facility represents a significant milestone in our mission to uplift women economically through recycling activities. As the central hub for the Economic Women Empowerment through Recycling Activities project, the venue will provide women with a dedicated space to collect and process plastic waste into valuable products, offering both economic and environmental benefits.

The orientation focused on equipping women with the knowledge and skills necessary for safe and efficient recycling practices. Participants were trained on the proper use of **Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)** to ensure their safety while handling recycling materials. The training was facilitated by WORF's dedicated staff, supported by an external safety expert, to provide comprehensive guidance on workplace safety protocols. This emphasis on safety reflects WORF's commitment to fostering a secure and empowering work environment.

An integral part of the session was the contribution of Ms. Kayombo, the Community Development Officer, who highlighted the importance of commitment, respect, and collaboration among the women. Her motivational insights underscored the significance of community solidarity in achieving the project's goals. Her message inspired participants to work cohesively, fostering a strong sense of unity and mutual support.

The demonstration venue and orientation mark the beginning of a transformative journey for the 120 women engaged in this project. By providing access to resources, skills, and a supportive community, WORF is not only empowering women economically but also contributing to environmental sustainability by promoting innovative recycling practices. This orientation is the first step toward creating lasting impact, and WORF is committed to supporting these women as they embark on this meaningful endeavor.



Results

Establishment of a Demonstration Venue:

Secured a dedicated facility to serve as a hub for plastic waste collection and recycling activities, providing a workspace for women to develop their skills and earn sustainable income.

Comprehensive Training Conducted: Conducted a Women Empowerment Training Orientation focusing on workplace safety, environmental practices, and the proper use of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE).

Trained 120 women, equipping them with essential knowledge and tools to safely handle recycling materials and transform plastic waste into valuable products.

Community Engagement and Motivation:

Fostered a sense of unity and collaboration among participants, inspired by motivational guidance from Ms. Kayombo, the Community Development Officer.

Commitment to Environmental Sustainability:

Established a foundation for promoting recycling practices and conservation that contribute to waste reduction and environmental health in the Makangarawe community.

Lessons Learned

Safety is Key:

Emphasizing the proper use of PPE and workplace safety protocols is critical in ensuring the health and well-being of participants, especially when handling potentially hazardous recycling materials.

Community Solidarity Enhances Success:

Commitment, respect, and collaboration among participants significantly influence the successful implementation of initiatives. Building a sense of community is essential for long-term project sustainability.

Holistic Training is Crucial:

Beyond technical skills, integrating motivational and behavioral guidance (e.g., teamwork and respect) creates a supportive environment that encourages active participation and mutual support.

Resource Accessibility Matters:

Securing a dedicated venue has proven essential in providing a stable and empowering space for women to work, learn, and collaborate effectively.

External Expertise Adds Value:

Partnering with safety experts and community leaders enhances the quality and credibility of the training, making it more impactful and thorough.





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Empower

As part of its strategic model to ensure women and girls achieve financial independence, the Women in Recycling Foundation (WORF) partnered with Equity Bank to integrate financial literacy and savings initiatives into its empowerment programs. This collaboration is a pivotal step in providing holistic support to women engaged in recycling and conservation activities, enabling them to build sustainable livelihoods while promoting financial independence.

During a visit to WORF's working hub, representatives from Equity Bank were introduced to the impactful initiatives underway, showcasing how plastic waste is being transformed into valuable products. The delegation expressed admiration for WORF's efforts in combining environmental sustainability with economic empowerment for women in the Makangarawe community.

The visit facilitated meaningful discussions on potential areas of partnership, with a focus on financial literacy and savings as key drivers of economic empowerment. Recognizing the importance of equipping women with financial management skills, WORF and Equity Bank agreed to design a comprehensive financial literacy and savings model tailored to the needs of the women participating in the program.

This model will aim to provide participants with essential financial knowledge and tools to manage their income effectively. Key components will include:

- 1. Financial Literacy Training: Teaching women how to budget, save, and invest their earnings responsibly.
- 2. Savings Programs: Facilitating access to savings accounts and financial services to build long-term financial security.
- 3. Capacity Building: Encouraging entrepreneurial thinking to help women reinvest their profits and grow their recycling micro-enterprises.

By integrating these financial management components into WORF's existing recycling programs, this partnership provides a holistic approach to economic empowerment. The initiative ensures that women are not only generating income but also acquiring the skills to achieve long-term financial independence. WORF is committed to working with Equity Bank to implement these programs effectively and provide ongoing support to participants as they progress on their journey toward financial self-reliance.

This collaboration is a testament to the power of partnerships in creating meaningful change, blending expertise from both WORF and Equity Bank to empower women and promote sustainability. Together, we are building a future where women can thrive economically while contributing to a healthier environment.

Next Steps

Design and Rollout of Financial Literacy Training:

WORF and Equity Bank will collaborate to design and implement comprehensive training sessions focusing on budgeting, saving, investing, and effective financial management tailored to the women's specific needs.

Establishment of Savings Programs:

Facilitate the creation of savings accounts for participants, providing access to formal financial services and enabling them to build long-term financial security.

Seed Funding Program:

WORF will design a program to offer seed funding to trained women's groups, enabling them to launch or expand their recycling micro-enterprises. This funding will act as a catalyst for their economic activities, fostering financial independence and business growth.

Monitoring and Support:

WORF will provide ongoing guidance and mentorship to ensure women can apply financial literacy lessons and effectively manage their personal and business finances.

Scale and Replicate:

Leverage the success of this partnership to expand financial empowerment initiatives to other groups and communities within WORF's program framework.

Evaluation and Adaptation:

Periodically assess the impact of financial literacy training and seed funding on participants' economic outcomes, refining the approach based on data and participant feedback.

Resource Mobilization:

WORF will continue building partnerships with financial institutions, stakeholders, and donors to secure additional resources for expanding access to financial tools, training, and seed funding.



2. In 2024, the women's groups formed through WORF's initiatives were equipped with the necessary tools and machinery to enhance their practical learning and income-generating potential. This included the provision of a plastic crushing machine, which plays a vital role in the plastic recycling process. These resources were generously supported by the Turkish International Cooperation Agency(TIKA), marking a significant step forward in empowering women to turn waste into valuable products.

With access to these tools, the women's groups are now better equipped to:

- Engage in Practical Learning: The crushing machine allows participants to gain hands-on experience in processing plastic waste, reinforcing the skills learned during training.
- Generate Revenue: By recycling and transforming plastic waste into sellable products, the women's groups can create sustainable income streams, contributing to their financial independence.
- Promote Environmental Sustainability: The initiative supports broader environmental goals by reducing plastic waste and encouraging sustainable practices within the community.



BRIDGE

Connecting Women to Markets and Opportunities

In 2024, as part of the "Bridge" model, the Women in Recycling Foundation (WORF) prioritized creating strong linkages between women's groups and market opportunities to ensure the sustainability and profitability of their recycling initiatives. Recognizing that access to markets is a critical factor in the success of small enterprises, WORF established partnerships and facilitated connections that enabled the women to transform their recycling activities into viable business ventures.

Through collaboration with stakeholders, including local buyers, corporate partners, and community networks, WORF successfully bridged the gap between women-led recycling enterprises and potential markets. These efforts not only increased the visibility of the women's products but also opened avenues for consistent revenue generation.

Key activities under the "Bridge" model included:

- Market Connections: WORF facilitated introductions between women's groups and buyers of recycled plastic products, ensuring a reliable demand for their output.
- Corporate Partnerships: Engaged with private sector companies interested in purchasing recycled materials, expanding the market reach of the women's enterprises.
- Community Networks: Leveraged local networks to promote the women's products and services within their communities, encouraging grassroots support and collaboration.

The "Bridge" model also emphasized capacity building in business management, equipping the women with skills to market their products effectively, negotiate contracts, and maintain professional relationships with buyers and stakeholders. These connections provided a critical pathway for scaling their recycling businesses, fostering financial independence, and contributing to environmental sustainability.



Thrive:

Sustaining Impact and Expanding the Circular Economy

In 2024, the Women in Recycling Foundation (WORF) took significant strides under the "Thrive" pillar to ensure the sustainability and long-term impact of its initiatives. This approach emphasizes resilience, scalability, and adaptability while addressing the broader challenges of environmental sustainability and economic empowerment. WORF expanded its circular economy model to include additional waste streams such as textile and food waste, complementing its focus on plastics. This diversification has enhanced both the economic opportunities for women and the environmental benefits of the program.

The expansion into textile and food waste recycling was a response to the growing need for comprehensive waste management solutions in the Makangarawe community. Textile waste was addressed through training on repurposing discarded clothes into reusable items such as bags, rugs, and clothing accessories. Food waste, on the other hand, was targeted for composting, producing organic fertilizers that hold both economic and environmental value. These new streams are integrated into WORF's existing programs, further solidifying the foundation for a sustainable circular economy.

Key initiatives and achievements under this model include:

Sustainability Practices:

WORF provided hands-on training to women's groups on maintaining their tools and equipment, such as plastic crushing machines, ensuring longevity and efficiency.

Participants were introduced to sustainable methods of processing textiles and food waste, with an emphasis on upcycling and composting techniques.

Business Growth Support:

Women were trained to expand their product lines, incorporating items made from recycled textiles and organic compost derived from food waste.

WORF facilitated mentorship programs and advanced training sessions to enhance participants' business management and marketing skills.

Access to new markets was established through partnerships with buyers interested in sustainable products.

Community Advocacy:

Women took active roles in promoting environmental stewardship within their communities, encouraging better waste segregation and recycling practices.

WORF collaborated with local authorities to advocate for inclusive policies supporting multimaterial recycling.

Monitoring and Evaluation:

WORF implemented tracking systems to measure the economic and environmental impact of its expanded recycling initiatives, ensuring that programs remain impactful and relevant.

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Results

Economic Diversification:

Women's groups reported increased revenue opportunities by diversifying their recycling activities to include textiles and food waste.

Environmental Impact:

Expanded recycling efforts significantly reduced the volume of textile and food waste in the Makangarawe community, complementing ongoing plastic waste reduction.

Leadership Development:

Participants emerged as community advocates, inspiring broader adoption of recycling practices and sustainable waste management solutions.

Scalability:

The integration of additional waste streams created a replicable model for other communities, enhancing WORF's capacity to scale its impact.

Next Steps

Advanced Training Programs:

WORF will develop specialized training sessions focusing on innovative techniques for recycling textiles and processing food waste into marketable products.

Strengthening Market Linkages:

WORF will continue to connect women's groups with buyers and organizations interested in eco-friendly textiles and organic compost.

Policy Advocacy:

WORF will collaborate with local governments to create supportive policies for multi-material recycling, including financial incentives and infrastructure development.

Scaling Initiatives:

WORF will replicate this diversified circular economy model in additional communities, engaging more women and scaling its environmental and economic impact.

Establishment of Community Resource Hubs:

WORF plans to set up hubs dedicated to the recycling of plastics, textiles, and food waste, providing centralized spaces for training, production, and collaboration.

CLIMATE AND FINANCE PROJECT

In 2024, the Women in Recycling Foundation (WORF) launched the Climate and Sustainable Finance Project, supported by the Africa-Europe Foundation (AEF) through its Partnerships Initiative Support Scheme. This project aims to address the urgent need for sustainable finance solutions to combat climate challenges while engaging youth in Tanzania in structured dialogues and practical activities. The initiative integrates insights from global platforms such as the UN General Assembly (UNGA) and the Conference of the Parties (COP), equipping young people with the knowledge and skills to lead and advocate for effective climate action.

The project achieved several significant milestones:

1. Youth Expert Convenings on Sustainable Finance:

A two-day workshop in September 2024 brought together 100 youth participants in Dar es Salaam. This convening provided essential training on climate finance, donor engagement, and social media advocacy while enhancing understanding of climate adaptation, mitigation, and global policy frameworks.

2. Community Climate Action Projects:

Engaged 200 youth in beach cleanups and tree-planting initiatives, resulting in the collection of 3 tons of plastic waste and the planting of 100 trees. These efforts promoted ecosystem conservation and reduced environmental degradation in Dar es Salaam.

3. Cross-Continental Webinar with European Youth:


Facilitated collaboration between 10 European youth and Tanzanian participants, fostering cross-border knowledge exchange and innovative approaches to sustainable finance and climate action.

4. Educational Workshops and Campaigns:

Reached over 500 students and community members through educational initiatives, increasing awareness of climate issues and promoting actionable sustainable practices such as waste reduction and tree planting.

5. Public Debates on Climate and Sustainable Finance:

Conducted debates involving 150 community members, encouraging dialogue on local and global policies and fostering collective commitment to sustainability.



Challenges and Adaptations

The project encountered unexpected weather disruptions, including rainfall, which delayed outdoor activities. Additionally, low initial engagement from economically disadvantaged youth posed a challenge. WORF addressed these issues by rescheduling events and increasing outreach through schools and community centers, ensuring broad participation and continuity.

Impact

The project successfully engaged 800 youth in Tanzania and 10 youth from the European Union, empowering participants aged 18–35 with critical skills in climate action and sustainable finance. The hands-on activities reduced plastic waste, promoted reforestation, and fostered a culture of environmental responsibility.

The cross-border collaboration expanded participants' perspectives and reinforced networks for future climate initiatives.

Next Steps

Looking ahead, WORF plans to:

- Expand community climate projects to include more regions.
- Scale educational workshops and establish a youth-led sustainability network.
- Develop an online resource hub for sustainable finance and climate action.
- Seek AEF's continued support to enhance outreach and ensure the project's long-term sustainability.



On Saturday, November 2, 2024, the Women in Recycling Foundation (WORF), in partnership with Dar Shapers and the Girls First Initiative, proudly launched the Niboreshe Project, funded by the World Economic Forum. This transformative initiative aims to empower girls and young women across the Temeke, Ilala, and Kinondoni districts in Dar es Salaam by equipping them with 21st-century skills through innovative mobile learning centers strategically located in these areas.

WORF plays a pivotal role in this project, leveraging the strong foundation we have built within local communities to serve as a mobilizer, ensuring active participation and engagement from target groups. Our established presence and trust within the community allow us to bridge the gap between the project and the girls and young women it seeks to empower. Beyond mobilization, WORF contributes by delivering training sessions focused on environmental sustainability and circular economy principles, fostering awareness and equipping youth with the knowledge and skills needed to address pressing environmental challenges.

This collaboration, funded by the World Economic Forum, underscores the importance of community-led initiatives in driving impactful change. WORF is deeply grateful for the support of local government officials, partners, and our dedicated team, whose efforts have been instrumental in launching this meaningful project. Together, we are shaping a brighter, more sustainable future for young women in Dar es Salaam, empowering them to become leaders in their communities and champions of environmental stewardship.



PARTERSHIP AND ENGAGEMENTS WITH POTENTIAL STAKEHOLDERS

1. In 2024, the Women in Recycling Foundation (WORF) had the privilege of hosting a delegation from the Turkish Cooperation and Development Agency (TIKA) at our office in Dar es Salaam. This pivotal meeting, led by Ms. Filiz Şahinçi, Director of TIKA Tanzania, laid the groundwork for a collaborative partnership aimed at empowering women through sustainable waste management and recycling initiatives. WORF presented its mission, vision, and key activities in the Temeke District, highlighting efforts to engage women in recycling initiatives that transform plastic waste into valuable resources, addressing both environmental challenges and economic hardships for women earning less than \$2 per day. Ms. Şahinçi and her team expressed strong support for WORF's integrated approach to environmental sustainability and gender equality, commending its impact on the community.

The discussion explored key areas of collaboration, including capacity building through joint training programs, resource provision such as plastic recycling machinery, and community engagement initiatives like awareness campaigns and workshops. Both parties shared a commitment to creating a replicable model for sustainable development that could be scaled across other regions in Tanzania, leveraging TIKA's resources and expertise alongside WORF's grassroots connections.

RESULTS

After three months of productive discussions and exploring avenues for collaboration, the Women in Recycling Foundation (WORF) and the Turkish Cooperation and Development Agency (TIKA) achieved a significant milestone. In September 2024, WORF and TIKA formalized our partnership by signing a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU).

This agreement solidifies TIKA's commitment to supporting WORF's initiatives by providing essential tools and machinery for waste management and recycling. This partnership marks a critical step in enhancing the capacity of women-led recycling activities, enabling participants to improve productivity, generate sustainable income, and contribute to environmental sustainability in the Temeke District. The MoU reflects a shared vision of empowering women and fostering a circular economy, laying the foundation for impactful, long-term collaboration.



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2. In 2024, the Women in Recycling Foundation (WORF) had the privilege of hosting representatives from the Korea International Development Center (KOICA) at our office in Dar es Salaam. This engaging session focused on exploring potential collaborations and partnerships aligned with WORF's mission of empowering women through sustainable waste management and recycling initiatives. KOICA, a renowned organization under the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Republic of Korea, is dedicated to fostering international cooperation through programs that address poverty reduction, improve quality of life, and promote sustainable development in emerging economies.

During the discussions, both organizations identified shared goals and values, emphasizing the importance of tackling the climate crisis while empowering women and communities. A key area of interest was the potential to integrate Korean volunteers into WORF's initiatives in Tanzania. This collaboration aims to enhance the capacity of local NGOs and volunteers to address pressing environmental challenges, ultimately fostering more resilient and sustainable communities.

The session concluded with a shared commitment to explore further opportunities for partnership, with **KOICA** expressing strong interest in supporting WORF's efforts to achieve environmental sustainability and women's empowerment. Both organizations are enthusiastic about the possibilities that lie ahead and remain dedicated to creating impactful solutions through collaboration.

3. As part of our commitment for exploring partnerships and collaboration In 2024, the Women in Recycling Foundation (WORF) had the pleasure of welcoming representatives from the **Sheria Kiganjani Organization** to our office to explore potential partnerships within the "Going Beyond" project, led by DOT Tanzania and the Mastercard Foundation. The discussions centered on collaborative opportunities to empower young women by equipping them with the essential skills and knowledge required to grow their businesses and achieve financial freedom.

This initiative aligns with WORF's commitment to fostering economic empowerment and community development, particularly among young women. The proposed collaboration aims to provide targeted support that addresses the unique challenges faced by aspiring women entrepreneurs, enabling them to thrive in today's competitive economic environment. This engagement represents a critical step toward building meaningful partnerships that drive transformative change and sustainable development.





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4. In August 2024, the Women in Recycling Foundation (WORF) had the honor of hosting representatives from the Africa Human Rights Network Foundation (AHRN) at our working hub. This visit provided a valuable opportunity to explore potential areas of partnership and collaboration in the fields of waste management and recycling. During the discussions, both organizations identified shared objectives in promoting environmental sustainability and economic empowerment for women. AHRN expressed strong interest in WORF's recycling and waste management initiatives, recognizing their potential to address critical environmental challenges while fostering financial independence for women. Highlighting their commitment to grassroots projects, AHRN expressed interest in providing financial support to WORF's ongoing and future initiatives.

RESULTS

As a result of the August 2024 engagement with the Africa Human Rights Network Foundation (AHRN), the Women in Recycling Foundation (WORF) secured a commitment to collaborate on drafting a comprehensive funding proposal. AHRN expressed strong interest in providing financial support to WORF's waste management and recycling initiatives, recognizing their potential to promote environmental sustainability and empower women economically.

This agreement marks a significant step forward in building a meaningful partnership that aligns with the shared goals of advancing grassroots initiatives and expanding WORF's impact in the community.

National Events

1.NGO's Participation in UN Processes for the Development of a Legally Binding Treaty on Plastic

Introduction

The Women in Recycling Foundation (WORF) actively participated in the UN-led process to develop a legally binding treaty on plastic, which took place on February 9th, 2024, at the Luther Board Room. The workshop was organized by The Women Towards Economic Development Organization, in collaboration with GAIA. The event brought together NGOs in Dar es Salaam to discuss and share insights on addressing the gaps in the proposed legally binding treaty on plastic.

Highlights of the Workshop

Understanding Legal Frameworks

• Stakeholders exchanged opinions on the analysis of existing legal frameworks for plastic management. Valuable suggestions were made for new regulations and actions to support the UN processes towards a legally binding treaty on plastics.

Packaging Predicament

• Despite ongoing efforts to regulate plastic covers, packaging remains a significant challenge. Reports highlighted the widespread use of plastic packaging, contributing to the persistence of plastic waste.

Bin Scarcity and Theft

• The lack of adequate waste disposal bins in certain areas exacerbates plastic waste management issues. The scarcity of bins is further intensified by theft, particularly targeting metal and plastic receptacles.

Stakeholders' Collective Discussion

Stakeholders engaged in a collective discussion on the local challenges of plastic waste management, highlighting several critical areas:

Gender-Sensitive Perspectives

• Stakeholders emphasized the lack of awareness among women and the need for a gender-sensitive approach in plastic waste management.

Language and Accessibility

• Concerns were raised about the exclusive use of English in plastic waste management content, which hinders local women's ability to act effectively. There was a call for action on inclusivity and language diversity in plastic waste awareness materials.

Legislation and Policy Focus

• Participants discussed the importance of implementing legislation and policies to mitigate the negative consequences of plastic waste. They stressed the pivotal role of legal frameworks in environmental protection.

Fostering Environmental Sustainability

• There was a strong emphasis on fostering environmental sustainability through education, with proposals to include plastic waste management in school curricula. Stakeholders also called for authorities to show resolute commitment to these initiatives.

International Women's Day Celebration - March 8th, 2024

Event Overview: On March 8th, 2024, the Women in Recycling Foundation (WORF) had the privilege of joining the @her_movement_tz organization in celebrating International Women's Day at Kibasila Secondary School.

The event was part of a global celebration, focusing on this year's theme, 'Count Her In: Accelerating Gender Equality Through Economic Empowerment.'

Theme and Focus: The 2024 theme aligns with the priority theme for the UN 68th Commission on the Status of Women (CSW 68) and emphasizes the importance of economic inclusion for women and girls.

It recognizes the ongoing challenges women face in achieving equal participation in the economy and calls for concrete actions to ensure equal opportunities for women and girls to build their capabilities, learn, earn, and lead.

The session included practical discussions on how waste management can be integrated into broader climate action strategies. This provided students with concrete examples of how they can apply their academic knowledge to real-world challenges.


Career Pathways in Environmental Science:

WORF at COP29 IN BAKU, AZERBAIJAN






WORF at UNCBD COP16 - COLOMBIA

WORF's Participation in the Dadas Rise Annual Forum 2024






